TRIDENT MAPLE Acer buergerianum

Displays outstanding heat and dry-soil tolerance as well as coping with semi-drought conditions making *A. buergerianum* excellent as a tree for parks and gardens in urban areas. An attractive, small, hardy tree with good autumn colour. Generally seedling grown, so can be quite variable in habit and foliage characteristics.

Foliage:

Shiny, triangular tri-lobed leaves have three main veins and a broad base. The spring growth is coppery-red, maturing to bright dark green in

summer and then turning to a brilliant greenish-red and orange in

autumn.

Flowers: Inconspicuous, greenish-white flowers borne in corymbs late spring.

Fruit: Green winged samaras, borne in pairs, ripen to reddish brown in autumn.

Culture: Tolerant of atmospheric pollution, semi-drought conditions and shows

some wind resistance with good structural strength. Generally has good

resistance to pests and diseases.

Size: 6 x 6 metre.
